The Access Card Committee continues to prepare for the access card changeover to take place next month. Card Access Committee

During August, the Card Access committee has been very busy preparing for the September 28, 2009 implementation. We have developed the Master Association member list for the distribution of access cards. A secured list of memberships was sent to our software provider by authorized Master Association members. Group access profiles were developed for the Pink Palace and MAC meeting rooms. This profile will be used to define access for the times and dates that the groups have identified for use. Once the conversion is completed, the new system card access will replace the current white/smart card access. In addition, all Master Association door entry points were defined in the automated system. ADT has been doing some site preparation during the month. This included wiring for the tennis court, chapel and cameras. The phone line required for on-line connectivity was also installed at the Pink Palace.

September will be a very active month. The implementation will commence on September 28, 2009, with completion of the conversion no later than October 5, 2009. ADT will complete all additional wiring and hardware installation. The installation will start with the MAC, chapel, library, pool and tennis courts. The Pink Palace, pool, exercise room, and sauna/whirlpool will be completed by October 5th. As each door is moved to the new access system, it will be posted with a notice that the door is now activated with the new access card. During the conversion, members of the Card Access committee will be on site to help with any questions or issues. In preparation for the conversion, cards will be distributed on the following dates:

- September 5th: 7:15 am to 9 am at the home owners' breakfast buffet location
9 am to 3 pm at the Pink Palace
- September 6th: 9 am to 3 pm at the Carolina Conference Center lobby
- September 12th: 9 am to 3 pm at the Pink Palace
- September 13th: 9 am to 3 pm at the Pink Palace

As a reminder, postings regarding time and location will also be placed throughout Sea Trail. Starting September 14, 2009, cards may be acquired at the Master Association office. This office is located in the real estate office across from the Jones/Byrd clubhouse. Please call Debra at 287-1192 for office hours. Remember, you must: 1) present a photo ID to receive your access card 2) access cards will not be mailed 3) you must contact Jennie Gregory to reserve a meeting room at the MAC or Pink Palace. After the conversion, retain your gold card. You will need this card for identification and purchases in the restaurants and golf pro shops.

Next month we will provide a final update on the conversion. In November, a conversion review will be provided. Please send us your comments, both constructive and positive, to one of these members: Ron Cymbyske, Walter Marsh, Tom Pickel, and Neil Weiss. If you have any questions regarding the pending conversion, please contact any of the committee members.

Rules Committee

When the original owners-developers started the Sea Trail Community our covenants-rules were developed and placed on file as public records in the Brunswick County courthouse. When Sea Trail homeowners purchase property here, they in effect acknowledge and agree to abide by these rules.

Following these rules makes our community attractive and protects our property values. Recently a terribly neglected Sea Trail home sold for 56% of its tax appraised value. This information is also now public record, and will certainly influence astute home buyers as they look at Sea Trail.

The Rules Committee recently published and distributed a rules handbook. Following these rules will make for an attractive place to live and enhance property values in our community. The Rules Committee strongly encourages all homeowners to, (1) know the rules, (2) obey the rules, and (3) help your neighbors and friends follow the rules. If all else fails, make a violation report for non-compliance with Debra Bordeaux at the STMA office. The forms can be found in your handbook or on our website. A Rules Committee member will follow up with you. This is your community, your home and your property investment. Don't be complacent.

Are you aware of the rule concerning vehicles and parking? "There shall be no storage or parking of any mobile home, tractor, trailer.... commercial vehicle, camper, recreational vehicle, boat, boat trailer.....except for loading or unloading..... . The above vehicle parking cannot exceed 48 hours without prior approval of the Master Association." You can find more on page 3. Look around your street. Is it in compliance?

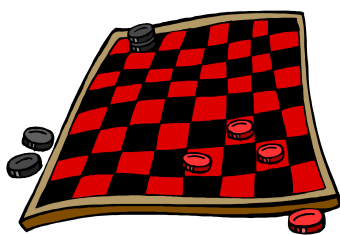

Strictly Thai here with such traditional favorites as Tom Yum soup (very spicy) to Pad Thai and various curries. Across from Grande Dunes at 82nd Parkway and relatively new is Indo which features Thai and Japanese Sushi/Hibachi. New, modern and comfortable, they too feature the traditional Thai noodle and curry dishes as well as some great specialties from the Sushi Bar. In Myrtle Beach proper you will find Thai Cuisine which is billed as a Mom & Pop restaurant. Small and quaint this little gem sits next door to The Library at 1210 N. Kings Highway. Again it's very traditional from the soups to the noodles, fried rice and curries. Last but not least is the Black Thai Restaurant and Wine Bar located on Main Street, and previously known as Royal Thai. The menu is not quite as extensive as some others but features many recognizable Thai dishes. Visit Black Thai at www.blackthai.com. Any one of these restaurants should satisfy a craving for Thai.

Spotlight On...

“The Beach Guys”

If you've been to Sunset Beach, you have most certainly seen the people on the quads who patrol up and down the beach making sure that everyone has a safe and pleasant experience. From Memorial Day to Labor Day, two people are on duty every day. One works from 7:45 until 4:15 and the other one works from 9:00 until 5:30. These people are officially known as the Sunset Beach Code Enforcers and five of them reside right here in Sea Trail. Frank Wiedman, Dave Ashley, John Tice, Rich Marchell, and newcomer Bob Cunningham all say they really enjoy their work but it comes with many responsibilities.

The main goal of enforcing the codes is public safety. Code enforcers make sure that beachgoers do not bring glass bottles on the beach, that pets are kept on leashes during the times they are allowed on the beach, and that surfers stay inside the posted limits. All rules are posted at the entrances to the beach but many people don't take the time to read them. The code enforcers are happy to explain the rules and answer any questions beachgoers have. Although they are alert to swimmers needing assistance, they are not lifeguards. They assist in finding children who are lost on the beach and can assist with simple medical issues like cuts from barnacles on the pier but they are not EMTs. They call 911 when someone needs medical help or when swimmers need to be rescued. If anyone is bitten by water predators such as crabs or rays or stung by jellyfish, 911 is always called.

Frank Wiedman, originally from Hudson Valley, NY, has been working the beach since 2002. “The supervisor of Beach Code Enforcement, Bob Tone, works every week day along with one other person,” Frank explained. “So the rest of us work about one or two days per week. I only work Sundays,” he added. “Sunset Beach still allows cabanas on the beach but they must be taken down each night. Most people rent them from 1 of 3 companies. These companies hire college kids to put up the cabanas at first light every day and then take them down each evening at dusk. Sometimes we have to remind people who own their own cabanas that they must be removed from the beach each night,” Frank explained. “If they are warned and fail to remove their cabana a second night they will be fined.”

Dave Ashley joined the team in 2003 after moving here from Atlanta. “We vacationed every year at Sunset Beach, and the kids would kid me about working as a code enforcer when I retired,” he joked. Last year when Dave was on duty, he was asked to stand atop a dune down toward the west end of the beach because a plane was scheduled to come and fertilize the dunes. “It didn't show up until 11:30 and by then it was high tide. When the plane swooped down and started spraying the fertilizer, beachgoers panicked. It took a lot of explaining including calling in the emergency management team from Wilmington to ease the fears of the people on the beach,” he explained. Another time, Dave was in the turtle rescue business. A woman told him there were baby turtles in the dunes. A nest had boiled in the morning and the turtles were confused. Dave rounded up volunteers who dug a trench to the water and carried the babies to it so they could safely make it to the ocean.

Rich Marchell gave up learning to play golf and was looking to find something else to do with his time. A friend of his suggested he apply to be on the code enforcement team and he's been doing it since 2002. “The best part of this job is talking to all the great people on the beach. Every day is unique and you never know what to expect,” Rich said. “The sun can really overwhelm you with intense heat, and even on overcast days you must remember to use sun block,” Rich cautioned.

John Tice, originally from Elmer, NJ moved here in 1999. He is a retired florist with a degree in both horticulture and floriculture. Although he still loves to work with plants and flowers, he decided to apply for the code enforcement job just because it was a great chance to meet new people and be on the beach. “Public Relations is really what this job is all about. Sunset Beach is a nice, friendly, family beach and it's our job to make sure that nobody spoils it for others,” John said. “The biggest danger to our job is dodging the deep holes that are dug by beachgoers. If they are left and we are racing up the beach to some emergency, we

can hit one and be thrown off the quad. The holes are also dangerous to the turtle patrol and to anyone walking the beach after dark,” he added.

Bob Cunningham moved here from Glen Cove, Long Island where he was a policeman for 24 years. He was also a volunteer fireman for 29 years in Glen Cove and is currently a volunteer fireman in Sunset Beach. Bob applied for the Code Enforcement team a year before he moved here and was hired as soon as he moved in. Bob likens this job to police work because discretion is needed in both jobs. “Most people break the rules because they don’t know the rules. If someone is openly drinking beer from a glass bottle, we go up to them and explain the rule and they thank us and that is the end of it. If we see someone quickly hiding their Coronas when they see us coming, then we know they are aware of the rules and they are given a citation,” Bob explained. During this past summer, a wallet with a considerable amount of money in it was turned in to the code enforcement patrol who in turn gave it to the police. Bob checked out the picture on the license in the wallet and went up and down the beach until he found the owner. “The man hadn’t even realized he had lost it but he was very happy to know that it was safely in the hands of the police and he could go and get it back,” Bob said.

The Code Enforcement Team can give out citations to anyone who violates the rules but they also use common sense. Their aim is to keep people safe and make them aware of the rules. They generally give out a warning and if the violation occurs again by the same people, then the citation is given. The fines range from \$25 up to \$100. The most common offense is having beer in glass bottles. The next most common violations have to do with dogs. Dogs are not allowed on the beach between 8 am and 6 pm during the summer months, but now and then someone will sneak in a small dog in a beachbag or take a dog out for a walk from one of the houses along the beach.

Frequently asked questions of the Code Enforcers include:

When is high (or low) tide?

Are there any sharks in this ocean?

Is the heat index really 106 degrees?

How did you get this job?

What restaurants do you recommend?

Where is the cheapest place to buy beer?

Can I drink alcoholic beverages on the beach?

How far is it to the jetty?

The code enforcers get to know the regulars on the beach and also some of the tourists who come every year and stay for 2 or 3 weeks at a time. One man told Frank Wiedman that he had been coming to Sunset Beach for 43 years. He used to bring his kids and now his kids bring him! Another man likes to run backward on the beach. There are also many locals that are dedicated to getting the best tan on the beach. One family that comes every year make wonderful sand sculptures that often take 2 or 3 days to complete.

Other beachgoers like to play games. The most common games are volleyball or bocce ball. The most unusual game Bob Cunningham has seen was played by a large group of people having a family reunion. “About 40 people lined up their chairs side by side facing the ocean. They sat there as the tide was coming in. If they wanted a drink or a snack, they raised their hand and someone would bring it to them. The last person to leave his chair was the winner. Of course by then the person was up to his neck in the high tide!” Bob laughed.

All of the people on the Code Enforcement Team are dedicated to making Sunset Beach a safe and enjoyable place to be. They are very proud of our magnificent beach and work hard to keep it that way!
