If you were to put your dog in an I.Q. test with other dogs, how do you think that he or she would do? If the test group included Harley Jack Daniels, a seven year old black Miniature Schnauzer, your dog might not fare too well. "Harley" as he's known to his friends, can identify and retrieve toys. He roots through his toy box until he has the exact toy, then he proudly delivers it to the human who had asked for it.

When Harley wants to go out, he does not bark at the door. That would be entirely too ordinary! He walks over to his special "paw bell," rings it, then waits patiently for his humans, Judie and Larry Daniels, to let him out. They are constantly surprised by the many words and phrases that Harley understands. So, it's no surprise to learn that the AKC consistently ranks the Miniature Schnauzer in its Brightest Dozen of all the breeds.

Intelligence is one of the traits that originally attracted Judie and Larry to the breed when they first considered getting a dog. Actually, it was Larry's idea to get a dog, and Judie reluctantly went along. The Daniels lived in Columbus, Ohio at the time. Larry had been talking about a bigger dog, and Judie had not really wanted a dog. They decided that, based on its size, intelligence, and non-shedding coat, the Miniature Schnauzer might be a good compromise. So when Judie noticed an ad for "Miniature Schnauzer Puppies," she asked Larry before calling, "If they have any left, what kind would you want?" "A black male," was Larry's reply, without hesitation. Judie called the breeder, who said that there was only one puppy not yet spoken for: a black male. Larry knew before they saw the little pup that it was "meant to be."

The breeder and her kennel were so well known throughout Ohio that people in the area would recognize her dogs when they were seen. This breeder was very discerning about who she would allow to adopt her dogs. She interviewed Larry and Judie, and after deeming them "acceptable," she presented them with a list of items that they had to acquire before being "allowed" to buy a pup from her. They were so smitten with the puppy soon to be known as "Harley" that they quickly gathered the required food, treats, kennel, feeding bowls, etc. And Harley went home with his new Mom

Judie and Larry agree, Harley was the easiest dog they quickly, and never presented a single problem for them.

He did try to outsmart them, of course. At first, when it came time for bedtime, he was crated overnight. Then, as he grew older, he was allowed to sleep with Judie and Larry. Judie would lift the young dog into bed each night, and he would snuggle in. Larry watched all this, then observed, "You know, he's big enough to hop up here on his own. Who is training whom?" Judie stopped lifting him up. Sure enough, Harley realized those "gravy days" were behind him, and he started hopping up on the bed at bedtime, no problem.

When Judie saw the large "doorbell" with a paw on it in a Radio Shack one day, she thought that if Harley would ring the bell when he wanted to go out, it would help them know when they needed to take him to the backyard. So, she bought the bell and installed it. At first, when Harley would sit by the back door, his usual indication that he needed to go out, Judie would walk over and put Harley's paw on the doorbell first. After it rang, she would let him out. After taking care of business outside, Harley would come in and Judie would reward his behavior with a treat. Of course, it did not take him long to figure out what he was to do. A short time after mastering that skill, he figured, "Why wait until I *have* to go out? Just ring the bell, go out for a 'token' visit, then hurry back in and get the treat." Soon, Judie and Larry noticed that they were being 'summoned' to the back door more and more often. They realized most of these were dummy trips. They began to watch, and stopped rewarding the token trips. In fact, token trips were then followed by a 5-minute time out in Harley's crate. Harley realized that his humans had figured out his ruse. The false alarms ended!

The Daniels have found Harley to be the "perfect" dog. He's friendly, energetic and playful. He loves running out to greet passing golfers in the Daniels' back yard. At 22 pounds, he is slightly larger than most of his breed. He has a sturdy build, a shiny black coat that does not shed, and he's small enough to get plenty of exercise chasing his toys around the house. He also travels well, having made the drive between North Carolina and Ohio many times.

Miniature Schnauzers were introduced to North America after World War II, and their energy, clean coats, and quick ways soon make them popular. The North American Kennel Club classifies the Miniature Schnauzer as a Terrier, while the Europeans still consider him part of the "Utility Group," a true working dog. The breed is know for its loyalty to its owner and family. The Daniels have clearly spent a lot of time playing with Harley and working with him, keeping him engaged. Schnauzers that are bored can spend a lot of time barking, getting into mischief, and chasing other animals. Even the Miniature Schnauzer is a tough, sturdy little dog whose personality is much bigger than his physical presence. Today, the Miniature Schnauzer is the most popular of the three Schnauzer sizes, and he is tenth in overall popularity among all the dog breeds recognized by the AKC.

Judie and Larry Daniels say that he's #1 in popularity in their home, and in their hearts too!
